### <u>CHAIR'S REPORT</u> SEPTEMBER 24 - 25TH., 1996

# Oth. Tourism Working Group Meeting 23-26 September 196

### GENERAL

The APEC Tourism Working Group held its 9th. Meeting on 24 - 25 September 1996 in Santiago, Chile. Representatives of 16 Member Economies attended the meeting. The list of participating Economies is as follows: Australia, Canada, Chile, People's Republic of China, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Philippines, Singapore, Chinese Taipei, Thailand and United States. A representative of the APEC Secretariat attended the meeting. PATA (Pacific Asia Travel Association), WTTC (World Travel and Tourism Council) and Peruattended as Guests.

The list of participants is attached as Annex 1 (9TWG/GRAL/1).

The Working Group was chaired by the Host Economy/Mr. Francisco Iturbe, from the National Tourism Board of Chile, SERNATUR.

### OPENING CEREMONY

The Director of the National Tourism Board of Chile, Mr. César Gómez opened the 9th. Tourism Working Group Meeting and welcomed the delegates on behalf of the Host Economy, and introduced the Under Secretary of Economy, Mr. Oscar Landerretche.

Mr. Landerretche addressed the meeting and emphasized the importance that Chile allocates to the activities that characterized the overall APEC process. In this context, Mr. Landerretche pointed out that Chile is in a highly favourable position to realize the potential of tourism, both in terms of flows of internal tourism and foreign visitors and in terms of the new investment which will be needed to develop this industry. At the same time, Mr. Laderretche stated that Chile as an economy is part of the Asia-Pacific region while, simultaneously, is part Latin American, particularly the Southern Cone, with a very strong sense of responsibility and great opportunity within APEC, which could promote rade and investment, as well as economic cooperation, as a bridge between both regions.(9TWG/PLEN/1).

The Director (Program) of the APEC Secretariat, Mr. Claudio Rojas was invited to address the meeting. He thanked the Host Economy for the preparation of this meeting, and emphasized the importance of the development of the APEC process. To maintain he momentum, he encouraged the Working Group to engage in the development of the APEC process on pursuing its goals and objectives.

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### III. CONSIDERATION AND ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

- The Draft Annotated Agenda (9TWG/PLEN/2/1) was submitted to the meeting. In consideration of the resignation of the Lead Sheperd of the Tourism Working Group, Mr. A.A. Nasution (9TWG/PLEN/9.3/1) it was suggested to address this issue at this point. The meeting was informed about Mr. Nasution's proposals for his replacement (9TWG/PLEN/9.3/2), and provided with two concept papers concerning the advice on the Rotation of Chairs and Lead Sheperd (9TWG/PLEN/2.1/1) and the Introduction on the Rotation System for Chair and Vice Chair of the Tourism Working Group (9TWG/PLEN/9.3/3).
- 5. It was explained that the position of the Lead Sheperd is a commitment of a particular economy rather than a personal one. Nevertheless, some economies made the point that Lead Sheperd should be related to an individual that has a commitment with Working Group and supported by his/her Economy.
- Because this matter has been raised without any previous notice, it was proposed hat the Indonesian representative, Mr. I Gede Ardike act as Lead Sheperd for this meeting. Members agreed to defer discussion on the proposal of the Lead Sheperd position for the next day, to allow consultations and further consideration of this issue.
- 8. Members of the TWG recorded their appreciation of the significant contribution ervices of Mr. Nasution as Lead Shepherd.

### V. REPORT FROM THE LEAD SHEPHERD

Mr. Ardike thanked the members and agreed to act in this capacity. Then he presented a written document (9TWG/PLEN/3/1) in which Mr. Nasution expressed his ratitude for the continuous support given by the Tourism Working Group during his landate as Lead Shepherd, and provided a report on the last development since the 8th. Tourism Working Group Meeting.

### Report on the APEC SOM Meetings.

O. The Director (Program) briefed the meeting on the results of the SOM's and related meetings in Cebu and Davao. He explained the implications of instructions given by SOM to the TWG. Members were informed about the several sectoral APEC linisterial meetings held during this year. The Director (Program) explained the nodalities to host these events are based on the grounds of the consensus reached by APEC Members Economies



- 11. Members of the TWG were instructed by SOM Chair to complete the TILF Matrix and the Report of Joint Activities in the area of ECOTECH, for final appproval and submission.
- 12. With some amendments, TWG agreed on the format and content of the TILF Matrix and recommended its submission by the Lead Sheperd to the Convenor responsible for the Services Area in the CTI (9TWG/PLEN/3.2/4-REV.).
- 13. To speed up the review process and the finalization of the Joint Report Matrix in the area of ECOTECH, a Steering Group was created and chaired by New Zealand and formed by Australia, Canada, Chile, Hong Kong, Korea and Chinese Taipei. This group was assisted by representative from the APEC Secretariat.

The group revised and updated the full range of activities developed by the TWG and incorporated new elements raised from this analysis. In the development of the Matrix the TWGS with some amendments, adopted the document (9TWG/PLEN/3.3/3-REV) attached to this Report as Annex 2.

### V. REPORT FROM THE APEC SECRETARIAT

- 14. The Director (Program) briefed the meeting about administrative and budgetary matters. He stressed the recommendations of SOM and BAC in regard of the guidelines to be followed by the TWG in its activities. He encouraged Members to develop project proposals according to guidelines governing the APEC Central Fund and the TILF special account, with a particular emphasis on the need to develop project proposals within the time frame defined by the budgeting process.
- Members were encouraged to develop project proposals for submission and approval by the TWG at its meeting scheduled during the first semester of each calendar year. This procedure will allow sufficient time for revision of project proposals and submission to BAC.
- 16. The meeting was informed on current work developed by the APEC Secretariat in support the work of the APEC Task Force instructed by SOM to review the overall management of APEC processes.

# VI. REPORT ON THE STUDY ON IMPEDIMENTS TO TOURISM DEVELOPMENT IN THE APEC REGION

17. Members agreed that any further amendments required to the Consultant's, Report on Impediments to Tourism Development in the APEC Region should be submitted to Australia by 18 October. The Report will then be printed prior to submission to SOM.



When approved, copies will be provided to member economies for release to a wider audience.

Recommended actions arising from the consideration of the report and the seminar are:

- a.- The need to achieve joint positions or common understanding on key issues with other Working Groups of APEC, through a program of joint meetings with other APEC Working Groups.
- b.- The opportunity to create a shared approach, between member economies and the private sector, on the forthcoming GATS negotiations.
- c.- The need to work more closely with the private sector in overcoming the barriers to tourism growth achieved through a program of workshops with industry across the APEC Region, directed to reviewing the issues, creating awareness and agreeing the scope for initiating change.
- d.- The preparation of an action plan by TWG identifying priorities for changes and strategies to overcome impediments.
- e.- The need for short term actions achieving, through cooperation, initiatives to reduce barriers associated with such areas as signage, training, passenger facilitation, supported by submissions for APEC funding for those cooperative actions requiring direct expenditure.

### VII. PROGRESS REPORT ON PROJECTS OF THE TOURISM WORKING GROUP

Report on the Economic Impact of Travel and Tourism in the APEC Region.

18. Australia reported that BAC had agreed to provide funding on a 50/50 basis with WTTC, at a total cost of US\$ 120,000 for a study of the Economic Impact of Travel and Tourism in the APEC Region.

The TWG discussed the scope of the study and recognized that it will provide an estimate of the total demand for travel and tourism in the region including estimates for 1997 and increast for 2007. Australia advised that communication with the WTO indicated that this organisation was supportive of the project and the WTO's data will be used in the study where appropriate.

It was noted that the WTTC hopes to have available draft results from the study for the ext meeting of the TWG. A communication strategy will be developed in consultation with the Project Steering Group for the launch and dissemination of the Report.



Report on the Feasibility of the Exchange of Tourism Statistics among APEC Member Economies through the Internet.

The meeting discussed a number of ways of efficiently exchanging tourism data. It also noted that the APEC Secretariat will shortly be distributing guidelines for Working Groups wishing to establish home pages on the Internet. Australia assisted by Singapore and the APEC Secretariat, was asked to bring to the next meeting a concept paper which would outline the possible use of the Internet including the content of a TWG home page and the linkages with other data sources.



Report on Tourism and Environmental "Best Practice" in APEC Member Economies. Tourism and Environment.

TWG, Observers and Guests were invited to prepare one "best practice" case study s set out in the project outline. The case studies are to be compiled as on APEC ublication. Central funding has been approved for the purpose.

Each economy, TWG Observer and Guest will be expected to provide the resources beeded to prepare its best practice case study. A list of headings to be used are set out in the project outline. All completed case studies are to be forwarded to the project coordinator (New Zealand) by 30th. April 1997.

### The Apogee Report

The Report Environmentally Sustainable Tourism was prepared under contract by Apogee Research Inc. for the Tourism Working Group (TWG) in 1995. The TWG greed to publish this report as a joint publication with the World Tourism Organisation.

Pelays have resulted finalising contract and publishing arrangements. The TWG agreed to we the private publisher (Routledge Ltd., London) until 30 October 1996, to confirm its intention to publish the report. If a commitment is not received by 30 October 1996, the port should be published as part of the APEC publication series (funding has already ten approved for this).

## III. NEW PROJECT PROPOSALS

# Weeting of Ministers In-Charge of Tourism in the APEC Region

The Philippines presented its proposal to convene a Meeting of Ministers in-Charge of Tourism the APEC Region to be held sometime in 1997. Some members expressed that they do not have a dinister portfolio who directly handle tourism matters and if their respective CEO could attend instead. this regard, the meeting agreed that the members would consult their respective authorities and abmit to the Philippines their positions before December 15, 1996.



### hoto-exhibit on Tourist Attractions of Asia-Pacific Region

TWG agreed to the proposal of the Philippines to organize a photo-exhibit on the tourism antiago / Chile tractions of the APEC Region during the Meetings of APEC Economic Leaders, APEC Ministerial eting and SOM in November 1996 in Manila. The Members were directed to submit at least five (5) and the Philippines with title and description not later than 15 October 1996.

### dy on Promoting the Cultural and Historical Heritage of APEC Region.

TWG agreed in principle to submit a project proposal for the Review and Analysis of the torical and Cultural Heritage of the APEC Region for funding by APEC subject to revision of the toposal. A steering committee comprising of the Philippines (lead), Malaysia, Australia, Mexico and would prepare the revised proposal before the BAC meeting scheduled in April 1997.

raddition, TWG agreed to submit the project for funding by APEC Central Fund, entitled Seminarrkshop on the Promotion of Culture and History in the APEC Region.

### ourism Occupational Skill Standards Development in the APEC Region

Indonesia presented the project related with the development of an occupational skill standard in a tourism and travel industry for the APEC Region. The research will provide a list of occupational standards valid for the APEC member economies. The said standards will include all occupational bicks with regard to travel and tourism services. The project will encourage exchange by experts tong APEC member economies.

e substantial materials and experiences on this matter within the members economies and other anisations, will be used as the basis for the study.

TG approved, in principle, the project as presented by Indonesia and suggested the creation of a tring Committee (New Zealand, Australia, Canada and USA) to finalize proposal and submit to the C Secretariat for budget approval by the BAC.

## **YOLUNTARY REPORTS FROM DELEGATIONS**

Member Economies presented reports on the latest developments in their tourism prs and distributed related materials.

ts were also invited to make presentations as a contribution to the activities of the

### OTHER BUSINESS

The participation of the Private/Business Representatives in the Tourism Working Group activities was discussed.

27. Chile proposed to incorporate private sector representatives in complementarity activities of the TWG, and established an appropriate channel of participation. It was agreed to incorporate in future Agenda a Report by the Industry Groups reflecting new initiatives of the private sector.

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### \_Non Member Participation

28. The TWG reached consensus on the participation as Guests in the TWG activities for 1997 calendar year of Peru and WTTC. Accordingly will convene this decision and obtain covering approval from SOM, through APEC Secretariat.

### Timing allocation of future Meetings

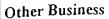
The meeting thanked Chinese Taipei for reaffirming the invitation to host the 10th. Fourism Working Group Meeting on 13 - 16 May 1997. TWG agreed and thanked Canada for offering to host the 11th. Tourism Working Group Meeting during the second semester of 1997 and acknowledged the goodwill of the Republic of Korea to host the 12th. Working Group Meeting in the first semester of 1998. The following members offered to host the 13th TWG meeting: Mexico, Malaysia and Philippines. This issue will be addressed at the next meeting.

### Lead Shepherd Position

The TWG agreed that the position and functions of the Lead Shepherd will be performed by a Chair together with a Deputy Chair for a one year period. At the end of the one year term, the Deputy Chair will assume the chairmanship. The Economy that is hairing the APEC Summit of that given year will be the one to assume the chairmanship of the TWG. The Economy that will chair the APEC Summit the following year will be the Deputy Chair of the TWG. As the result of the endorsing of this principle, Canada will chair the TWG starting January 1, 1997 for one year, with Malaysia acting as the Deputy Chair. For the year 1998, Malaysia will Chair the TWG and New Zealand will act a Deputy Chair. In the interim, Indonesia kindly accepted to chair the TWG until the nd of 1996 with Canada acting as the Deputy Chair.

hose Host Economies of TWG Meetings will assume and perform the role of a convenor of that particular Meeting. Starting at the 10th TWG Meeting, the proceedings of TWG Meeting will be captured in a Summary Conclusion instead of the current Chair's leport.





- 31. The meeting aknowledged the need to address the issue of the overall management of the TWG and its activities to be discussed if forthcoming meetings. However, the TWG agreed, in principle, on the following duties for the TWG Chair:
- -Oversee the development of the overall activities of the TWG, and liaise with other APEC fora,
- Coordinate the schedule of meetings,
- Lead the implementation of iniciatives for the TWG to fulfill the instructions gien by the APEC Leaders, Ministers and Senior Officials and report on the development of these issues, and
- -Represent, and act as the spokeperson for, the TWG externally,
- The duty of the TWG Deputy Chair will be to assist and jointly work with the TWG. Chair to fulfill the mandate given by the TWG.
- 32. The TWG expressed its recognition and aknowledged the valuable contribution of its funding member Mr. Hunter H.T.EU. from Chinese Taipei being this his last participation in the TWG.

### XI. CONSIDERATION AND ADOPTION OF THE CHAIR REPORT.

After a very constructive discussion, the TWG endorsed the Chair's Report as the Summary Conclusion of the 9th Tourism Working Group Meeting.

### XII. <u>CLOSING REMARKS</u>

- Mr. César Gómez, Director of the National Tourism Board of Chile SERNATUR), addressed the Meeting and expressed deep gratitude of SERNATUR and Chile for having the opportunity to host this Meeting. Mr. Gómez expressed his desire that the delegates visit to Chile had been an opportunity to familiarize them with the Chilean reality and its people. Mr. Gómez commented on the work done by the TWG and the results achieved. Finally, he extended a warm invitation for the delegates to visit Chile again.
- 75. The meeting commented and acknowledged with appreciation the excellent transferrents done by the Host economy and the hospitality and warmth of the Chilean people. For many delegates visiting this side of the Pacific Rim, has been an opportunity of discover that "Chile is closer than you think..."
