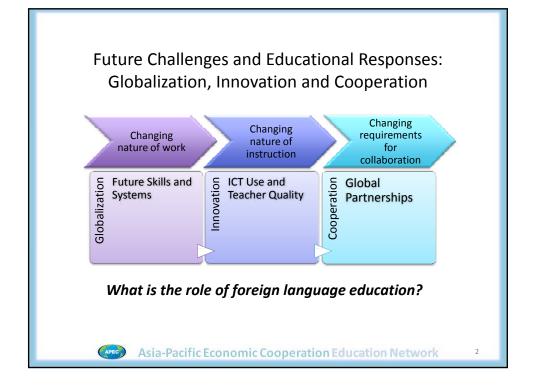

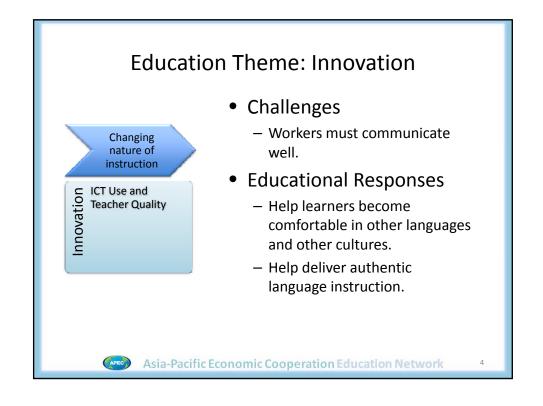

 - Promotes cross-cultural collaboration and communication.

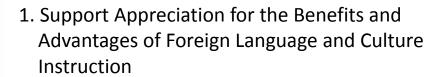

Research Supports the Following Actions:

- 1. Appreciation for the benefits and advantages of foreign language and culture instruction
- 2. Articulation of language programs from K-16
- 3. Implementation of programs models infused with instructional technology innovation
- Exploration and replication of successful instructional methods from other economies
- 5. Design and implementation of experimental and other rigorous research studies to determine the effectiveness of specific program interventions and maximize their impact on foreign language teaching.

- 2. Support the Articulation of Language Programs From K-16
- Fluency is the goal of foreign language instruction.
- Programs must be coordinated and consistent throughout all grade levels, K-16.

3. Support Implementation of Program Models Infused with Instructional Technology Innovation



- Technology can:
 - Provide access to authentic materials and exposure to target language
 - Motivate students
 - Allow communication & collaboration (student to student, teacher to teacher)
 - Provide access to FL learning to a greater number of students.

- 4. Support the Exploration and Replication of Successful Instructional Methods From Other Economies
- Hong Kong, China, Malaysia, Singapore, and Thailand begin second language instruction in Grade 1.
- Sixty percent of EU secondary students study two foreign languages.



- 5. Support the Design and Implementation of Further Research in Foreign Language Education
 - There is still a lack of research on program and intervention effectiveness.
 - It is challenging to make comparisons across schools or economies without rigorous, longitudinal, experimental studies.
