	The demand for health care is evolving rapidly in APEC economies in a context of population aging and the growing number of people living with one or more chronic conditions. To meet the challenge of these demographic and epidemiological shifts, APEC health systems need to strengthen primary care systems to provide continuous, comprehensive, and coordinated care for their populations. Strengthening primary care could strike twice in the fight against non-communicable diseases by offering a basis not just for delivering care, including palliative care, and managing the diseases, but also to help prevent diseases. In this session, APEC Health Ministers will discuss their views using their economy-specific contexts on why Primary Health Care is needed and how it can address more effectively present-day challenges.

14:30 – 16:00	Session 3: Harnessing the Full Potential of Innovative and Digital Technologies in Primary Health Care Increasing demand from complex, co-morbid patients, and a shift in delivering that care closer to home means that the existing model of primary care is no longer fit for purpose. There is a need for new models to integrate more innovative technologies to help drive efficiencies and improve patient care. Utilizing digital health technologies can help to improve health system efficiencies while also reducing inequalities. To achieve this, important fine-tuning is needed to make sure that financing is stable, regulatory reforms are planned and executed and supervision systems are put in place. In this session, APEC Health Ministers will discuss the policies leading to the adoption of digital technologies in primary care, how digital technologies are improving care coordination and outcomes in APEC economies, as well as key concerns and possible future developments.

16:20 – 17:40	Session 4: Modernizing the Role of Health Professionals in Primary Health Care The Alma-Ata declaration recognized that primary care goes beyond services provided by primary care physicians to encompass other health professionals such as nurses, midwives, auxiliaries, and community health workers. However, by 2035, the world will be short of 12.9 million health-care workers; today, that figure stands at 7.2 million. The largest shortages in numerical terms are in the APEC region. One of the challenges for achieving universal health coverage is ensuring that everyone – especially people in vulnerable communities and remote areas – has access to well-trained, culturally-sensitive and competent health staff. The best strategy for achieving this is by strengthening multidisciplinary teams at the primary health care level. Achieving greater patient-centered primary care entails developing new models of shared-care based on multidisciplinary practice and modernizing the role of health professionals to best meet complex health care needs.

09:30 – 10:45	Session 5: Innovative Finance to Expand Access to Healthcare The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) include a sub-goal on health financing that aims to "substantially increase health financing" by 2030. The Addis Ababa Action Agenda of 2015 has already made the case for increasing domestic funding for health by re-envisioning such commitments as investment cases and introducing innovative financing mechanisms, including private funding and external support. Innovative and alternative health financing mechanisms, such as health promotion funds using sin-taxes, health savings accounts, micro-insurance, donor seed funds, blended financing, long-term insurance, buffer funds, and product development funds, among others, would allow economies to leverage their limited resources to expand health coverage. This session will explore case studies of innovative ways APEC economies are using public and private financing of health care and the policy and regulatory environment that facilitated these innovative schemes.

11:00 – 12:15	Session 6: Working Towards High-Performing People-Centered Primary Health Care Ensuring high-performing people-centered primary health care will require a transformation characterized by features of comprehensiveness, integration, continuity of care and participation. As healthcare systems in the APEC region transition to reward and reimbursement based on value rather than volume, patient-centered primary care will be a cornerstone in efforts to improve care management particularly for patients with chronic illnesses and ensuring a continuity in care and communications for patients most in need. In this session, APEC Economy representatives will share their experiences and examples of how they were able to enhance and/or re-organize health care to address overwhelming challenges and bottlenecks.
