Aligning the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities with the APEC Putrajaya Vision 2040

1. Introduction

The ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities focused members collective efforts on meeting the commitments outlined in the Economic and Technical Cooperation Section (Part II) of APEC's framework for achieving the Bogor Goals - the Osaka Action Agenda. During the 2014 review of the Manila Declaration, members agreed that the concepts of ECOTECH had broadened and it was time for a 'new cycle' that refreshed and updated existing priorities. Similarly, with APEC having adopted the Putrajaya Vision 2040 (APV2040) and subsequently an implementation plan to achieve its objectives in 2021 -the Aotearoa Plan of Action (APA), there is a need to revisit the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities to ensure that they are fit for purpose and aligned with APEC's APV2040.

2. Background

Historically, the 1996 Manila Declaration on an Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation Framework for Strengthening Economic Cooperation and Development outlined the key areas of APEC economic and technical cooperation. In 2006, Ministers reaffirmed their commitment to the Manila Declaration, with a revised set of priorities established in 2010 and further refined in 2014 (2014/SOM3/SCE/002) that covered cross-cutting and work stream priorities:

Cross-cutting priorities

- 1. Developing human capital through capacity building
- 2. Developing and strengthening the dynamism of SMEs
- 3. Harnessing technologies for the future and supporting innovation
- 4. Inclusive growth addressing the social dimension of globalization, health, gender

Workstream priorities

- 5. Regional economic integration
- 6. Structural reform
- 7. Safeguarding the quality of life through sustainable growth
- 8. Human security

Due for review in 2019, SCE took the decision to delay to ensure that the Medium-Term priorities were aligned with the APV2040 including through its implementation plan, the APA (2019/SOM1/019, 2021/SOM1/SCE/SUM and 2021/SOM2/SCE/021).

In 2020, APEC Economic Leaders charted APEC's course for the next 20 years with the APV2040. Further, in 2021, APEC Economic Leaders agreed to implement the APV2040 including through the APA. The APA outlines the three economic drivers, alongside the objectives contained in the APV2040, while adding Medium-Term priorities or collective actions as the mechanism to facilitate the achievement of the longer-term goals of the APV2040 as well as the continuous improvement of APEC as an institution and review and renewal.

3. Approach

This approach fully subscribes to the original aims that guided the formulation of APEC's ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities and seeks to identify key areas of APEC economic and technical cooperation as outlined in the APV2040.

The SCE plays a lead role in supporting the achievement of APEC's vision including through the APA, and provides direction to SCE sub-fora on implementation matters. The collective actions are central to advancing APEC's ECOTECH agenda and APEC Leaders' ECOTECH-related priorities. The SCE will continue to oversee, coordinate and provide policy guidance to the SCE sub-fora, while also contributing to the implementation of the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities.

As evidenced by the mapping exercise below, the previous ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities align and are captured within the APV2040 and APA's economic drivers, objectives and collective actions. This exercise acknowledges the synchronicity between the APA's medium-term priorities or collective actions and the timelines and intention of the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities. Thus, the mapping seeks to first align and then integrate relevant collective actions into the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities framework for its next five-year cycle.

The below chart details the three economic drivers (column one), ECOTECH-related objectives (column two), and accompanying ECOTECH-related collective actions (column three) of the APA to implement the APV2040, mapped against key responsible SCE sub-fora spearheading specific areas of work on APEC's ECOTECH-related Collective Actions (column four) as well as the previous ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities (column five). Note that the below identification of key responsible sub-fora is not exhaustive, and other sub-fora may contribute to the achievement of the outcomes outlined in the APV2040 and the APA.

This exercise provides further guidance to SCE and its sub-fora as they implement the APV2040 including through the APA, and will center and focus ECOTECH-related workstreams around the specific collective actions most relevant to each SCE sub-fora. SCE sub-fora will be expected to reflect the updated ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities (the ECOTECH-related collective actions of the APA to implement the APV2040) in their work plans as well as in end year reporting, while using existing templates and reporting structures. When it comes time to renew Terms of Reference and Strategic Plans, SCE sub-fora will also be expected to carefully consider and incorporate ECOTECH-related Collective Actions in all governance document updates.

In addition, the SCE and its sub-fora are encouraged to work towards the achievement of ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities in a manner that is reflective of APEC's efforts to continuously improveAPEC as an institution, outlined in the Putrajaya Vision 2040 and the APA. These efforts could include deepening engagement with ABAC and the private sector, as well as PECC, PIF, ASEAN, and other international and regional organizations; promoting engagement with a broader range of economic stakeholders, such as NGOs and civil society, to reflect the breadth of the APEC Putrajaya Vision 2040; and continuously improving communications of APEC's work to the broader public.

4. Next Steps and Reporting

Originally, all APEC Committees and fora were requested to recognize the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities in their work planning; however, in recent years only SCE and SCE sub-fora have reported on them annually. In addition, the SCE sub-fora are required to report on activities under each priority in their annual fora report (see generally 2014/AMM/015, Annual Work Plan and Fora Report Templates).

As of 2023 while SCE and its sub-fora continue implementing the Putrajaya Vision in a comprehensive and balanced manner in accordance with their mandate, and make provision for implementing the APV2040, including through the APA, in their terms of reference, work plans and strategic plans, SCE and its sub-fora will also draw from the ECOTECH-related APA Collective Actions or renewed ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities outlined in the mapping below to inform annual workplans. These collective

actions will serve to update the previous ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities, which were incorporated into SCE sub-fora work plans. The key responsible SCE sub-fora,' are expected to reflect some or all of the ECOTECH Collective Actions identified in the mapping (now the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities) in their work plans and end year reporting. However, all SCE sub-fora are welcome to self-identify and incorporate relevant ECOTECH-related Collective Actions in their governance and reporting documents.

SCE and its sub-fora will continue to report on progress in the implementation of the APV2040 and the achievement of the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities through existing reporting templates, submitted on an annual basis, as per the standard reporting processes in place. This reporting will then be included in the <u>Senior Officials' Report on Economic and Technical Cooperation</u> tabled at the APEC Ministers' Meeting. SCE will review the ECOTECH Medium-Term Priorities in 2027 with a view towards adjusting, as deemed necessary, and in full alignment with the priorities set out in the APV2040 and the APA.
