

Legal mandates: MTIB Act 1973 & Customs laws



Core enforcement functions:

- Licensing & inspection
- Export-import documentation control
- Timber legality verification via MyTLAS

Forest Level: Unauthorized logging, permit fraud





Misdeclaration, species substitution



Operating unlicensed sawmills



Falsified export documentation







Timber Trafficking: Notable Cases Revealing the Scope & Tactics





• Declared premium timber as low-grade.

La Ghost Mills & Digital Forgery

- Inactive mills issued fake processing documents.
- Spoofed export permits with fake QR codes.

Transshipment Loopholes

- Timber declared as 'in transit' was offloaded illegally.
- Enables timber laundering and law circumvention.


