Theme

- Fragmented data across supply chain stakeholders
- Limited AI expertise within customs authorities
- Low trust in AI-driven decision systems

Proposed Solutions

- Co-designed pilot projects between customs and business
- Enhanced real-time connectivity between stakeholders
- Stronger alignment of digital trade regulations


